ADMINISTRATION AND ATHLETICS COMMITTEE MINUTES TUESDAY, 22 NOVEMBER 2005

I. CALL TO ORDER

The Florida International University Board of Trustees' Administration and Athletics Committee meeting was called to order by Chairman Albert Dotson on Tuesday, 22 November 2005, at 8:17 am, at University Park, Graham Center Ballrooms, Miami, Florida.

The following Committee attendance was recorded:

Trustees Kirk Landon and Bruce Hauptli were also in attendance.

II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Committee Chair Albert Dotson asked if there were any additions or corrections to the minutes of the 6 September 2005, Administration and Athletics Committee meeting. Hearing none, the Committee adopted the following:

RESOLVED that the minutes of the 6 September, 2005 meeting of the Administration and Athletics Committee held on, attached to this Resolution as Exhibit "A," are hereby approved.

III. CHAIRMAN'S REMARKS

Committee Chair Dotson congratulated University Provost Mark Rosenberg on being named Chancellor of the State University System. Chairman Dotson commended Provost Rosenberg on his many accomplishments as Provost and thanked him for his thirty years of dedicated service and commitment to Florida International University and the South Florida community. The Chairman also welcomed acting Provost Ronald Berkman.

Committee Chair Dotson noted the impact of Hurricanes Katrina and Wilma on the University. He reported that as a result of excellent planning efforts, the University positioned a team to address the hurricane aftermath and as a result the campuses were fully operational within few days after each occurrence. Committee Chair Dotson commended the Emergency Management Team on their Herculean effort. He also noted that classes for the fall 2005 semester were extended for one (1) week to make up for lost time.

Committee Chair Dotson noted the good performance of the football program after moving to Division I-A and added that the University's football team was set to compete against the University of Miami in the 2006 and 2007 seasons. Committee Chair Dotson congratulated Athletic Director Rick Mello on his efforts with recruiting and scheduling. He also congratulated Athletic Director Mello and the University football team on their victory over Western Kentucky on 19 November 2005.

Human Resources and Labor Report

University CFO and Vice President of Human Resources Vivian Sanchez reported that the University implemented Hurricane Emergency Assistance Loans in order to offer financial support to University employees during the hurricane aftermath. She noted the terms of the loans, that the loans were well-received by University employees, and that the University had approved seventy-nine (79) loans to date.

Vice President Sanchez reported that the PeopleSoft Human Resources module implementation was still pending and options for implementation during 2006 were being considered, including outsourcing.

Vice President Sanchez reported that the three (3) month period to negotiate with the faculty (UFF) stipulated by the Board concluded on October 24, 2005. She noted that UFF, citing the disruptions of Hurricanes Katrina and Wilma, had requested an extension to finalize the union negotiations. VP Sanchez reported that negotiations were still underway with the Nurses Union (SEIU).

Athletics Association of the FIU Foundation

Vice President Marcos Perez reported on the establishment of an Athletic Association to facilitate promotion and fundraising for I-A football. The Athletic Association would be under the Foundation Board of Directors Athletics Committee.

Athletics Facilities Update

Vice President Perez reported that because of the University's transition to Division I-A it was now necessary to expand the football stadium. He reported that the projected cost for the retrofitting of the football stadium would be \$25 Million and that the project would be funded through non E&G funds. Trustee Landon suggested the University consider ways the retrofitted stadium could be utilized in the off-season by University and community entities.

VI. OTHER BUSINESS

Chairman Dotson thanked everyone present for their participation in the meeting. He also extended best wishes to the University's departing Provost, Mark Rosenberg.

ADJOURNMENT

With no other business, the meeting of the Florida International University Board of Trustees' Administration and Athletics Committee was adjourned on Tuesday, 22 November 2005, at 8:55 am.

FURTHER RESOLVED that upon approval of the Update, the University Administrator shall file the survey with the Commissioner of Education and the State Department of Education Office of Educational Facilities.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

STATUTORY AUTHORITY:

Florida Statutes 1013.31(1), "Educational plant survey; localized need assessment; PECO project funding,--" states in part,

(1) At least every 5 years, each board shall arrange for an educational plant survey, to aid in formulating plans for housing the educational program and student population, faculty, administrators, staff, and auxiliary and ancillary services of the district or campus, including consideration of the local comprehensive plan. The Office of Workforce and Economic Development shall document the need for additional career and adult education programs and the continuation of existing programs before facility construction or renovation related to career or adult education may be include in the educational plant survey of a school district or community college that delivers career or adult education programs. Information used y the Office of Workforce and Economic Development to establish facility needs must include, but need not be limited to, labor market data, needs analysis, and information submitted by the school district or community college.

(a) Survey preparation and required data. — Each survey shall be conducted by the board or an agency employed by the board. Surveys shall be reviewed and approved by the board, and a file copy shall be submitted to the Office of Educational Facilities and SMART Schools Clearninghouse within the Office of the Commissioner of Education.

The Needs Assessment portion of the Florida International University Educational Plant Survey was conducted on February 16-17, 2006. This letter reports the University understanding of the recommendations of the Survey Team.

Site Improvements Recommendations:

- 1.1 Landscaping/site improvements are continued for each campus consistent with its adopted Campus Master Plan.
- 1.2 Satellite Utilities Chiller Plant is recommended.

Remodeling/Renovation/Addition Recommendations:

2.1 All projects requiring renovations to space vacated in conjunction with construction of new facilities that require no significant changes in space categories are recommended.

New Construction/Expansion Recommendations:

- 3.1 International Hurricane Center is recommended
- 3.2 Public Safety is recommended.
- 3.3 Classroom/Office at BBC is recommended.

- 3.4 Theatre at BBC is recommended.
- 3.5 Honors College is recommended.
- 3.6 Graduate Classroom is recommended.
- 3.7 Science/Classroom Complex Phase I and II are recommended.
- 3.8 Graduate School of Business Phase II is recommended.
- 3.9 Humanities Center/Offices is recommended.
- 3.10 Construction Management Building at EC is recommended.
- 3.11 Training Complex is recommended.
- 3.12 Health-Sciences Laboratory Clinic is recommended.

Standard University-Wide Recommendations:

SR1. All recommendations for new facilities include spaces necessary for custodial services and sanitation facilities.

- SR2. All projects for safety corrections are recommended.
- SR3. All projects for corrections or modifications necessary to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act are recommended.
- SR4. Any project required to repair or replace a building's components is recommended provided that the total cost of the project does not exceed 25% of the replacement cost of the building.
- SR5. Expansion, replacement and upgrading of existing utilities/infrastructure systems are recommended to support the educational plant, as expanded or modified by the recommended projects.

ATHLETICS UPDATE

PROGRAM UPDATE

Swimming & Diving

FIU's swimming and diving team finished 4th in the conference, a stellar feat for a four year old program. Senior Megan Balkenbush (Ft. Collins, Colorado) won the conference championship in both diving events, bringing her career total to five titles. She is a member of the Sun Belt Conference Academic Honor Roll. Junior Zita Zalai (Szeged, Hungary) won the title in the 200 IM.

Indoor Track and Field

The women placed 3rd and the men placed 6th in the Sun Belt Championships in February. The women were led by junior Donita Harmon (Albuquerque, NM) who was named the Most Outstanding Female performer of the meet. She was conference champ in the 200 meters, 2nd in the 400 meters, 5th in the 55 meters on only seven minutes of rest between events, 6th in the long jump and ran a leg on the 400 meter relay. Elisa Dieme-Erlich (Paris, France) won the long jump.

Football

There have been three coaching changes on the football staff. Defensive Coordinator Bernard Clark returned to his hometown and is becoming the Defensive Line Coach at South Florida. Running Back Coach Tony Nathan is now the new Running Back Coach of the NFL Baltimore Ravens. Defensive Line Coach Clint Hurtt has returned to his alma mater (University of Miami) where he will be the Defensive Line Coach.

Don Strock has replaced two of the positions to date. Former Arkansas All-America and NFL running back Madre Hill will coach running backs. Last year, Coach Hill was on Steve Spurrier's staff at South Carolina. Kevin Forquier, a 15-year coaching veteran and former Assistant Head Coach and Defensive Coordinator at Middle Tennessee, will take over as Defensive Line Coach.

Basketball

Women's basketball is currently under consideration for the National Invitation Tournament. The women are currently 15-11 and ranked in the Top 75 nationally (RPI). The women are the 3rd seed (East Division) in the Sun Belt Tournament while the men are entering the tournament as the No. 4 or No. 5 seed.

Women's Tennis

The tennis team is ranked No. 41 in the country despite having two student-athletes out due to injuries. FIU has defeated FAU (7-0), Alabama-Birmingham and No. 57 Florida State in Tallahassee. Doubles team Paula Zabala (Miami, Florida) and Nikita Fountain (Nassau, Bahamas) are ranked 19th nationally.

Baseball

The team has gotten off to a 6-10 start; however all of the team's losses have come to elite teams – Miami, Southern California, and Alabama.

FACILITIES UPDATE

Construction has begun on the 8,000-square foot training room and office complex. The training room (where student-athletes receive medical treatment) is scheduled to open in August 2006 and the office complex in December 2006.

ACADEMIC REPORT

The department's cumulative grade point average was 2.86, the highest in department history. The NCAA released the Academic Percentage Rate (APR) on March 1. All of FIU's 17 sports made either the cut score of 925 or reached the standard on the confidence boundary. The program improved from 910 to 932. The department goal is for every program to reach the 925 cut score and to be in the top half of all institutions in Division 1.



Florida International University

ATHLETICS FACILITIES UPDATE

Background: Florida International University's transition to Division 1A Athletics

included a prerequisite of an expansion and upgrade to the athletics facilities. The two areas that will be impacted in this plan are the training

room and the football stadium and offices.

Current Status: The transition to Division 1A is now complete, placing FIU among the

elite 119 institutions competing at this level. The expansion of the football stadium at this time is necessary to provide the additional capacity needed for the 2008 season. The FIU home opener versus University of South Florida in September of 2008 is the beginning of the successful scheduling of premier programs traveling to FIU that season. The original plan called for opening in 2007, however with additional information received from the consulting company Johnson Consulting (same company that

performed UCF's football stadium study), it was recommended to move the projected opening to 2008 to facilitate more input into the final stadium design and to create more time to generate outside revenue to

fund the project.

Model: The existing location of the FIU stadium will house the new 24,000 to

33,000 seat stadium, maximizing the current field and infrastructure. The stadium will include 16 luxury suites which will double as graduate classrooms. All football offices, locker rooms, restroom facilities, and concessions areas will be upgraded. The estimated cost of the project is

\$30,000,000 to \$35,000,000 at 24,000 seats.

Funding Options: The options to fund the stadium will be completed by December 2006 and

include the use of private funding, guarantee game money, ticket/ sponsorship revenue, and other sources. The Board of Governors have determined that student fee income may be used for this project which may enable the University to either broaden the scope of the project or have additional funds available to increase the capacity of the athletics program. There will be no Education and General (E&G) funds used for

this project.

Key Issues: Home games scheduled for the 2007 season need to be moved to an

alternate location.



ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION UPDATE

Mission:

Establish an Athletic Association that will focus on increasing awareness, revenue and community support of the Florida International University Athletics Program; leverage the decision already taken to compete in the Division 1A level; serve as a tool to enhance marketing, recruiting, growth, loyalty, and campus life for the university.

Situation Summary: Florida International University has been competing at the Division 1 level since 1986. In 1999, the university began playing football. Five years later, FIU announced its decision to transition to Division 1A, the highest level of intercollegiate athletics. FIU's Athletic Department is currently made up of seventeen Division 1A varsity sports teams.

> In 2005, Florida International University realized that in order to be competitive in Division 1A and benefit from the leveraged exposure brought to the university, it was necessary to enhance the business plan with a focus on expanding the stadium, improving the facilities, and increasing operating revenue. As a result, the Athletic Association was created. It is the ultimate goal of the FIU Athletic Department with the increase in its national exposure, to serve the university as an educational and research institution to reach its identified objectives.

Model:

PHASE I (Complete)

The FIU Athletic Association has developed its leadership team including an Executive Director and Chairman. Joe Velasco was hired in December to serve as the Executive Director. Joe comes to us from Terremark Worldwide, where he lead the marketing and sales efforts for all indirect channel partners worldwide and Huizenga Holdings, where he held positions with the Florida Panthers and Florida Marlins, and served on special projects for the Miami Dolphins. Jorge De Cespedes accepted his appointment as Chairman of the FIU Athletic Association in January, bringing a love of FIU athletics and credibility to the Association, both internally and externally. Together, the leadership team will ensure all Association initiatives are developed successfully.

In the early stages of the Association, research of several leading university athletic departments was conducted in order to determine the best initial efforts in order to position FIU Athletics for years to come. The profile and requirements for the board members of the Athletic Association have been set and the early stages of the Panther Booster Club have been established with the setting of donor levels and benefits.

Model: PHASE II (Ongoing)

The FIU Athletic Association leadership team has established and begun executing the goals and priorities for the Association. Together, they will recruit a volunteer board (number of members to be determined) which will develop a marketing/promotions/fundraising plan and establish measurable goals in key areas. Another initiative for the Association is the development of an annual fund drive for the Panther Booster Club. With the expansion of the football stadium, the Association will provide a marketing plan as well as a Go-to-Market Strategy. Finally, the Association will maintain the responsibility of developing an Athletics Marketing Plan that serves the needs of the university and helps attain its objectives.

Timeline: March, 2006 Begin Recruitment of Association Board Members

Develop FIU Athletics Marketing Plan

April, 2006 Finalize Association Board Members

Develop Annual Fund Drive (Panther Booster Club)

May, 2006 First Association Board Meeting
